

1963-2012 Some examples Bangla drama

- 1. 1963 The Oriantals deliver Sirajuddaual at Barbican Centre
- 2. 1971- Mukti Jodi Patey Chau Ostro Hate Tule Nao by Dr Enamul Huque – started July 71 and toured for 3 months, including ICA Gallery – 6/7 cast and the first play was at Trafalgar Square
- 3. Early 1970s- late 1980s / early 199s Bengali Artists
 Association and Bangladesh Youth Movement delivered many
 plays in a several different venues
- 4. 1992- Marilybone Bangladesh Association stage 3 plays
- 5. 1996-2000 by annual Bengali Drama Festival at Toynbee Hall
- 6. 1985 2012 Surma Centre arranged many plays
- 7. 1999-2012 Message Cultural Group was formed as a creative cultural organisation in the late 1999 by a group of young and enthusiastic people
- **8. 2006-2012** Soulfire Theatre
- 9. 2001 2012 A Season of Bangla Drama at Kobi Nazrul Centre and Brady Arts Centre

Bengali Artists Association (BAA) and Bangladesh Youth Movement (BYM)

Bethan Green Adult Education Institute

- 1. Struggled to attract Bengali people to attend the English classes set up by the Institute and high degree of distrust existed
- 2. A charity concert at the Institute in late 1960s to respond to a disaster in Pakistan lead to more people attending the classes
- 3. An increase in the demand to use facilities at the Institute lead to the setting up of drama classes and then later music and poetry
- 4. Key people are: Mr Amar Bose, Barrister Lutfur Rehman Shahjahan, Kutib Uddin
- 5. Mr Bose taught drama and directed many plays and Mr Shahjahan played role of production co-ordinator
- 6. The institute became a base for individuals to meet, join a variety of classes, socialise and work towards producing cultural shows
- 7. At first the activities were undertaken under the umbrella of Bengali Artists Association and later into several including BYM Drama Group, the major group to continue drama in East London








1998 – 21 Plays


2000 – 26 Plays


The plays were in Bengali, bilingual and Sylheti and included dance / drama

Festival had Bangladeshi and West Bengali contributions, including the participation of *Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan*





A Season of Bangla Drama is in its eighth year. There is a long history of Bengali theatre that has been produced and performed in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. Many people remember attending Bengali Dramas being performed at Queen Mary College, Tower Hamlets Girls School (now Mulberry School for Girls), Curtain Theatre and the Half Moon Theatre from the late 60's to the early 90's. It is worth noting that on the first opening day of the Kobi Nazrul Centre on 23 October 1982 a Bengali play was performed at the Centre. The play 'Beer Bangali' (Heroes of Bengal) was written by a local writer and performed by local actors. At present most of them are making a significant contributions in various fields.

The Kobi Nazrul Centre is continuing that tradition of promoting Bengali drama for local people, and each year we urge both established and emerging local drama groups to participate in A Season of Bangla Drama providing rehearsal space and support for participants. We also welcome groups from across and outside London to get involved in bringing an even greater breadth of experience to this important cultural platform, and to local audiences.

It is the Centre's aim to promote Bangla culture both across the Capital and regionally. We are proud to initiate various events and projects including music, dance, drama and poetry recitation.
